

Pascal Laugier's brutal and disturbing 2008 thriller is a prime example of Gallic gore. Two young girls are kidnapped and tortured; one escapes and, years later, come calling for revenge. But that's just the beginning of this truly transgressive and unforgettable plunge into terror. Not for those with weak stomachs.



In tribute to the late, great Dennis Hopper, we present Tobe Hooper's underappreciated sequel to his infamous drive-in classic. Instead of trying to duplicate the creepy, neo-realist tone of the original Chainsaw, Hooper amps up the humor and gore in a sly satire of 80's consumerism, while still providing several disturbing set pieces. Jim Siedow returns as the head of the Sawyer clan, Bill Moseley stars as new nutso Chop Top and Caroline Williams is our DJ heroine in distress. But ultimately, it's Hopper's show, as his lunatic Texas Ranger embarks on a one-man odyssey of camage and revenge.
